The Carrier's Address for the Salem Gazette on New Year's Daay 1882 departed from the custom of verse and consisted of a transcript of a meeting by newsboys to decide what should go into the address that year. A committee of three called a meeting. They all wanted to talk about public affairs but could n't agree on what to say." They discussed filling in the Mill Pond. "Then they started on temperaance. But one wanted prohibition, one license, and one 'free rum.' It was just the same with women's rights, and the Irish question." So then the boys agree to give those present to make a one-minute speech on any subject and that would be the address.

Speaker No. 1: "We boys think we ought to have a better chance, and we are going to tell you once a year what we think about it. We know you are interested in us boys [Umph, much they care, donm't they grumble where a paper blows away on a windy morning?] Well, they ought to be interested if they aint. We don't think a boy ought to have to go away from Salem to learn a trade or earn a living. [Well who does have to go?"] Lots of boys; you'll have to if you ever do anything. We want to say here and grow up with the city."

Speaker No. 2 got up to say he didn't believe in running down a place you live in. I think Salem is the most enterprising city in the State. It's a good healthy place." He is hit with a barrage of opposition: "oh! oh!" Where's the Public Library? Free Baths."

Speaker No. 3 quoted his father that "politics makes all the trouble. He don't care who's Mayor. He says one's as bad as another. He didn't vote all this year." He calls for licensing of liquor. [Is your father running this meeting?" "What's that got to do with the Address?] "Well, I thought we were trying to find out what's wrong with Salem, and I thought if politics was the matter we have better let 'em alone. And besides that I think the city ought to look out for the boys. There's plenty of rich people who could give everybody good wages if they wanted to, and the city government ought to make 'em. If they don't want us to drink and loaf round they ought to do something about it."

Speaker No. 4. He gets up to disagree with Jack, (No. 3) "I think we ought to have a Public Library, and a Reading Room... But I don't think that's all Salem ought to do for the boys and girls who want to be decent and keep out of the streets. I don't ask any favors behind a good start and a fair chance, and I think we might have that. I know lots of fellows who go to rumshops just to get out of the cold. I wish what was said about politics could be left out of the Address. I don't want people to think we are such confounded fools [order, order.] Well, I've said it and I'll stick to it. I should like to know what would become of this country if it was n't for politics. We boys have to go take hold of this thing and make politics mean something. [Oh, ain't you green?] Well I should like to find a greener looking boy than Garfield was when he was sixteen years old --"

Time

Speaker No. 5: Thinks they ought to put something in the address about Garfield. "I think every poor boy in the country feels more sure that a poor boy can have a chance if he want one, since knowing about him." Admitted he shed some tears when his (funeral) train came passed by.

Number 6 sums up: "We want good air to work in and to sleep in. We've got good water to drink; now we want clean water to swim in. We want less rum and more books; we want fewer rum-holes and a Public Library. We want the men who have got money to do business right here in Salem so that we boys won't have to go to Springfield or Worcester to learn a trade."

A corporate-sponsored charity in St. Louis has sponsored Old Newsboys Day since 1957. Volunteers sell special editions of a local journal on street corners and in businesses, and donate the proceeds to local charities. Recent sponsors have included Hardee's Restaurants, Brinks Armored Car Service, UPS, and Marriott Hotels, as well as the local Suburban Journals newspaper chain. Few of the volunteers are old, that is to say former newsboys, but they, too, have encountered some of the hazards of the job. In 1989, a 53-year-old volunteer, John J. Krebs, was struck by a school bus rear-view mirror while selling the papers and sustained "mild head injuries."¹

"Every five cents collected from each visitor to the Dom of the Pulitzer Building is added to a fund used to relieve the distress of sick babies in the crowded tenement sections of New York City during the killing heat of summer. Doctors are engaged to care for them, wholesale milk and food are furnished, and other things done to make the existence of the little ones more endurable."²

Our hospital bills became exceedingly heavy; from fifty to one hundred boys had to be treated weekly for serious bruises, lacerations, etc. The W.J. Burns Detective Agency employed by me to identify our foes was outspoken in its reports. It named names." Agency encouraged him to file complaint with DA's office. Thought it would be waste of time for newcomer. Fought back in own way. "Each night we appeared, carrying on our front page the portraits of our newsboys beaten by thugs. The caption read: "Is Los Angeles going to stand for such jungle methods of competition." Guerilla warfare continued until one night a lighted torch was thrown atop one of their trucks driven by a crippled veteran. The truck caught fire and the veteran suffered heavy burns. Local Post of American legion called an indignation meeting and rivals changed tactics. (65)
